



## How do I know if cancer runs in my family?

Please select all that apply:

- Do you have more than one family member on the same side of the family with the same type of cancer?
  - Some cancers “go together”
    - Breast, ovarian, and pancreatic
    - Colon, endometrial (uterine), and ovarian
- Do you have a personal or family history of breast, endometrial (uterine), or colon cancer first diagnosed at a young age (under 50 years old)?
  - Cancers of genetic predisposition are often found in younger patients
- Do you or others in your family have histories of more than one occurrence or type of cancer?
  - Two different types of cancer in the same person
    - Breast and ovarian
  - Cancer in both breasts
- Is there a personal or family history of rare cancers?
  - Ovarian
  - Male breast cancer
  - Medullary thyroid cancer
  - Adrenocortical carcinoma
- Have you or a family member had more than 10 polyps (adenomas) in their colon?
- Does anyone in the family have a documented change (mutation, rearrangement, insertion, deletion) in cancer predisposition gene?
  - BRCA 1 or 2, p53, ALK, Lynch Syndrome: EPCAM, PALB2, TP53, APC
